## **EXCURSION TITLE: CHEPSTOW AND LYDNEY**

### SUMMARY OF EXCURSION (FOR MORE DETAILS CONTACT THE **EXCURSION LEADER):**

A tour of Chepstow Castle, and possible quick visit to the Museum opposite. Chepstow Castle is one of the few castles in Britain that traces evolution of military architecture from 1066 to 1690; the period of the castle's useful life as a form of defence. Then after lunch, to Lydney Park Estate to see the Iron Age Hill Fort and the Roman Temple (excavated in 1928-29 by Dr and Mrs R.E.M. Wheeler). The sites are on the Lydney Park Estate. We will also have an opportunity to view both the private museum, in Lydney Park house, and the Gardens that should be magnificent in late April. Special cream teas can be ordered (by prior arrangement and a minimum of 25 people booking) to be served in the "Dining room of the Mansion".

IS THERE A GUIDE? Yes for both Chepstow and Lydney visits.

SHOULD I BRING MY OWN LUNCH? It's up to you! The tour of the Castle should finish by 12 noon leaving free time in the town.

TRANSPORT: A coach will depart from 21, Wellow Mead, Peasedown St John (Jayne Lawes's house) at 8.30a.m. and there will be a second pick-up point at Bath Coach Station at 9.a.m.

WHERE AND WHEN DO WE MEET IF I AM MAKING MY OWN WAY? This is an organised trip only- People are not expected to make their own way.

WHAT TIME IS IT LIKELY TO END? The coach will leave Lydney Park Estate at approximately 5pm.

HOW MUCH WILL IT COST? £13.45 per head which includes B&CAS transport, entrance fees (except the optional Chepstow Museum) and Guides. If you want the Special cream tea as well the price is £15.95.

SUMMARY OF EXCURSION (FOR MORE DETAILS CONTACT THE EXCURSION LEADER):

A visit to the old Roman town of Dorchester and the spectacular Iron Age Hill Fort of Maiden Castle. We will visit first the excellent museum in Dorchester, followed by some free time to look around. A visit to the recently restored Roman Town House is recommended, as is the Tutankhamen exhibition.

After lunch we travel by coach to at 2pm to Maiden Castle. In AD 44 the Second Legion under Vespasian attacked the Hill Fort and left a trail of carnage and destruction at the east gate. Bodies of defenders and many thousands of sling stones were found during excavation.

IS THERE A GUIDE? Yes: - At Dorchester at 11am we will receive a short talk by Peter Woodward who is the Deputy Curator of the Dorchester museum. Peter Woodward will be our guide again at Maiden Castle at 2.30pm.

SHOULD I BRING MY OWN LUNCH? If you wish. Lunchtime will be in Dorchester where there are opportunities to buy food.

SUMMARY OF EXCURSION (FOR MORE DETAILS CONTACT THE EXCURSION LEADER):

A walk and talk by Isla Tuck around this ancient village which was owned for 300 years by the nearby Carthusian Priory. The cottages range from 15<sup>th</sup> century to about 1830 in date. The Church of St John has Saxon origins and with Norman architecture in evidence. Hear the story of the Carthusians and visit the old Priory sites.

We will finish with a cup of coffee or tea at the church or a pint of real ale at the local hostelry- or both!

TIME: We meet at 7.30pm at the Church after making our own way there.

The walk will take approximately one and a half hours over fairly flat terrain.

COST: There is no charge but a voluntary donation to the Church would be welcomed.

SUMMARY OF EXCURSION (FOR MORE DETAILS CONTACT THE EXCURSION LEADER):

Visit Stonehenge (where we will make an ordinary visitors tour of the stones) and afterwards enjoy a lovely circular walk where we can view the Stones, in their dramatic landscape setting. Also we can visit other sites close by. We will see the Normanton Barrows to the south, the most famous linear cemetery of Bronze Age Britain. To the north are the Cursus and other barrow cemeteries.

It goes without saying the scenery is magnificent!

The circular walk is 4 miles and adequate clothing and footwear is essential. The walk starts and finishes at the coach park.

SHOULD I BRING MY OWN LUNCH? Yes, there are no pubs close by. A packed lunch is recommended but it is possible to purchase hot and cold snacks in the Car Park centre including the famous "Megalithic roll"- which you will be relieved to hear is not made of stone like its namesake, after our visit to the stones and before we embark on the walk.

WHERE IS IT? Starts at the Car Park Centre at Stonehenge at approx 10 am

WHAT TIME IS IT LIKELY TO END? Coach collects us at the end of the walk departing from Stonehenge at 5.15pm

HOW MUCH WILL IT COST? Coach is £7, with cheques to Ken Appleby (CHEQUES MADE PAYABLE TO B&CAS) The entrance fees to Stonehenge can be paid on the day on an individual basis. The current entrance price is £3.90 full, £3 children and £2.90 Senior Citizens. Members of English Heritage and National Trust get in free.

SUMMARY OF EXCURSION (FOR MORE DETAILS CONTACT THE EXCURSION LEADER):

Visit the lovely Newton Park with the Georgian Mansion House and lake designed by Capability Brown. The Park is now part of the campus of Bath Spa University College. There is also a "Castle" complete with dungeon and a 15<sup>th</sup> century gatehouse. This was part of the mediaeval fortified manor house and has been much altered over the years.

We finish with a fairly flat walk around the pretty Newton St Loe village with its fine Church and 1698 Free School which is now all part of Duchy of Cornwall land.

Dr Graham Davis, a lecturer at Newton College, is our guide for this evening. He is an interesting and well-known lecturer on the Bath circuit.

We meet at 7.30pm in front of the Mansion House where there is plenty of parking. at Bath Spa University College.

To find the college take the Bristol A4 road from Bath, after approx. 2 miles at the Globe inn roundabout, take the first left exit past the pub signposted to Corston, Marksbury and Weston Super Mare and then after 50 yards, turn left into the drive of the college, and follow the drive for one mile to the house.

The tour will take approx. 2 hours and there will be a charge of £2 each, to be collected on the night.

SUMMARY OF EXCURSION (FOR MORE DETAILS CONTACT THE EXCURSION LEADER):

A walk and talk by Gordon Hewlett:

Visit this attractive greystone type Cotswold village with its lovely Church of St Julian, rebuilt in 1372. The village architecture, which ranges from 15<sup>th</sup> century to Georgian, includes a mediaeval packhorse bridge. See the site of the old station and hear the sad saga of the signal boy and the rail disaster. Also visit the two ends of the mysterious Wellow tunnel (the north end was recently uncovered), and hear the story of the canal.

There is also an ancient pub that is highly recommended, with an old slab floor, which dispenses real ale.

Make your own way there and we will meet at 7.30pm at the car park opposite the Village hall.

The tour will take approx. one and half-hours. The terrain is slightly hilly.

There is no cost but a voluntary collection for the Church would be appreciated.

# SUMMARY OF EXCURSION (FOR MORE DETAILS CONTACT THE EXCURSION LEADER):

Your invitation to Langridge from John Oswin

Coming from the hamlet of Lansdown, down the narrow lane from the Blathwayte Arms, you first pass through Upper Langridge, with its cottages, schoolhouse, Victorian rectory and Upper Farm. Then nothing apparently, but fields and a glorious valley view. Continuing further down, you see a farmstead and it is as you come to it that you find the real delight of Langridge - the little group of Court Farm and the church. Do not look further for a village - you are in it. It is just the scatter of buildings on this spur and the next, and by the stream. There is no ordered or planned settlement like neighbouring Woolley. Court Farm and the Church are both fascinating buildings. The church is Norman and beneath the East Wing of Court Farm are probably the remains of a building of similar age. The West Wing is a fine example of a mediaeval cross-wing with its fourteenth century transomed window. But what of the strange tower next to it?

As well as the buildings, enjoy the superb scenery and the sense of complete seclusion. It is difficult to imagine that you are less than five miles from the centre of busy Bath!
